The matinée performance on Sunday 15 December is performed to recorded music. Recording by Queensland Symphony Orchestra and Voices of Birralee, conducted by Nigel Gaynor.

A classical ballet in two acts, based on E.T.A. Hoffmann's tale of *The Nutcracker and the Mouse King* (1816). First performed on 18 December 1892 by the Imperial Ballet at the Mariinsky Theatre, St Petersburg, Russia. This production of *The Nutcracker*, choreographed by Ben Stevenson OBE in 1976, was first performed in 1987 by Houston Ballet in the Wortham Theater in Houston, Texas. The acquisition of this production of *The Nutcracker* was enabled in 2013 by the generous support of Valmai Pidgeon AM and Amanda Talbot, and Queensland Ballet first performed it on December 5, 2013. More recently, the production has been supported by Presenting Partner, Sealy of Australia.

About the Characters

Clara

Clara is the eldest child of Mr and Mrs Stahlbaum. At her family's Christmas Eve party, she is delighted to receive her very own Nutcracker toy from the magical Dr Drosselmeyer. After the party, when she falls fast asleep she finds herself on an incredible adventure!

Fritz

Fritz is Clara's younger brother. He is very naughty and gets up to a lot of mischief at the Christmas Eve party.

Dr Drosselmeyer

Dr Drosselmeyer entertains the children on Christmas Eve with his magical tricks and wind-up dolls. He gifts the Nutcracker to Clara and inspires her magical adventure!

The Sugar Plum Fairy and the Nutcracker Prince

The Sugar Plum Fairy is the ruler of the Kingdom of Sweets. Once Clara arrives to the Kingdom, the Sugar Plum Fairy and the Nutcracker Prince dance The Nutcracker grand pas de deux for her.

The Nutcracker and Rat King

In Clara's adventure, her Nutcracker doll comes to life to help her defeat the Rat King! The Nutcracker then transforms into a handsome Nutcracker Prince.

The Snow Queen and Snow Prince

Transforming the Stahlbaum's house into the Land of Snow, the Snow Queen and the Snow Prince dance with the Snowflakes. After a beautiful dance, Clara and the Nutcracker Prince depart for the Kingdom of Sweets in a beautiful, enchanted sleigh.

The Story

ACT I

Herr Stahlbaum and his wife are giving a Christmas party. Clara and Fritz, their children, greet the guests. All the children are given toys by their parents. Suddenly, the mysterious Dr Drosselmeyer arrives and entertains the children with his magical tricks and wind-up dolls. Dr Drosselmeyer brings a special gift for Clara, a wooden Nutcracker. In a jealous fit, Fritz breaks it, but Dr Drosselmeyer quickly repairs the Nutcracker. The party ends, the guests leave and the Stahlbaums retire for the night. Clara awakens, the clock strikes midnight and the room fills with giant mice which attack her! Life-sized toy soldiers, led by the valiant Nutcracker, come to her rescue. The King Rat attacks the Nutcracker, but Clara hits him with her shoe and the Nutcracker wins the battle. After the battle, the Nutcracker turns into a handsome prince. The Nutcracker Prince transforms the Stahlbaum's house into the Land of Snow. The Snow Queen and the Snow Prince dance with the Snowflakes. Clara and the Nutcracker Prince depart for the Kingdom of Sweets in a beautiful, enchanted sleigh.

ACT II

Clara and the Nutcracker Prince continue their journey across the Lemonade Sea. When they arrive in the Kingdom of Sweets, the cooks are preparing delectable treats for their enjoyment, and they are greeted by the Sugar Plum Fairy. In Clara's honour, the Sugar Plum Fairy arranges for the inhabitants of her kingdom to entertain them while they eat by performing a Spanish dance, an Arabian dance and a Chinese dance. Clara is also entertained by the Dance of the Mirlitons, a dance with Mother Ginger and her children, a Russian dance and the Waltz of the Flowers. Then, the Sugar Plum Fairy and the Nutcracker Prince dance a grand pas de deux. As the celebration draws to a close, Clara drifts off to sleep. She awakens from her dreams as the Nutcracker salutes his Princess Clara.

For Young Audiences





ACT I

Clara and Fritz are playing with gifts at their parents' Christmas party. In a jealous fit, Fritz breaks Clara's Nutcracker doll, but the mysterious Dr Drosselmeyer repairs it. When the clock strikes midnight, the room fills with giant mice which attack Clara. Life-sized toy soldiers led by the valiant Nutcracker come to her rescue against the King Rat. The Nutcracker turns into a handsome prince and transforms the house into the Land of Snow. Clara and the Nutcracker Prince depart for the Kingdom of Sweets in an enchanted sleigh.

ACT II

When they arrive, the Sugar Plum Fairy and all the kingdom's inhabitants entertain them with beautiful dances. As the celebration closes, Clara drifts off to sleep. She awakens from her dreams as the Nutcracker salutes his Princess Clara.




About the Choreographer

Ben Stevenson served as Artistic Director of Houston Ballet from 1976-2003, raising the company from a regional troupe of 28 dancers to an internationally acclaimed ensemble of over 50 artists.

For his contributions to international dance, Mr Stevenson was named an Officer of the Order of the British Empire (OBE) by Queen Elizabeth II in the New Year's Honors List in December 1999. In April 2000, he was presented with the Dance Magazine Award.

In July 2003, he was appointed Artistic Director Emeritus of Houston Ballet, and the company's affiliated school was renamed Houston Ballet's Ben Stevenson Academy.

Mr Stevenson, a native of Portsmouth, England, received his dance

training at the Arts Educational School in London. He appeared with the Sadler's Wells Royal Ballet and English National Ballet where, as a principal dancer, he performed leading roles in all the classics.

In 1967, English National Ballet asked him to stage his first, and highly successful, production of *The Sleeping Beauty* which starred Margot Fonteyn. In 1968, Rebekah Harkness invited him to New York to direct the newly formed Harkness Youth Dancers. After choreographing *Cinderella* in 1970 for the National Ballet in Washington, D.C., he joined the company in 1971 as Co-Director with Frederic Franklin.

Mr Stevenson has received numerous awards for his choreography, including three gold medals at the International Ballet Competitions of 1972, 1982, and 1986. In 2018, Mr Stevenson was acknowledged by the Chinese government as one of the most influential Foreign Experts in the past 40 years since China initiated its policy on Reform and Opening Up.

In July 2003, Mr Stevenson assumed the artistic directorship of Texas Ballet Theatre in Fort Worth, Texas.
