Stepmother

Cinderella's father is a gentle man who is heartbroken after the death of Cinderella's mother. He loves his daughter, but shies away from conflict.

The Story



inderella finds herself on a journey with many challenges before her. Sadly, her dear Mother had passed away many years ago. Her gentle Father remarried a widow with two daughters of her own. At first her Stepmother seemed to fulfil their dreams, but soon revealed her true cruel nature.

Our story starts in their home kitchen where Cinderella stops her stepsisters from roughly teasing her father, but reveals

a pair of special shoes, a gift from her dearly missed mother. The stepsisters return and snatch the shoes away.

An old woman enters, begging for food. Stepmother scornfully gives her the precious shoes instead, but the woman returns them to Cinderella. Stepmother then receives a surprise invitation to the royal ball, where they will meet the Prince!

The dancing master arrives to prepare the stepsisters for the royal dances. Cinderella is left at home to do the chores. The mysterious beggar returns; and magically changes into her Fairy Godmother and the kitchen transforms into an enchanted forest.

Cinderella meets the Fairy Godmother's magical friends – a flighty dragonfly and fairy – who help create magic with their dancing. Her rags are transformed to a beautiful gown and a pumpkin grows into a carriage to take her to the ball. But the Fairy Godmother warns Cinderella, her magic will only last till the chimes of midnight.

Upon arriving at the palace, the Prince gallantly invites each of the stepsisters to dance, much to the amusement of all. Festivities are interrupted by the arrival of Cinderella. She is so beautiful and graceful, the Prince is immediately smitten.

The Prince and Cinderella dance together long into the night, and then, the clock chimes twelve times; it is midnight! Cinderella's clothes turn to rags as she rushes from the ballroom, leaving one slipper behind in her haste. The Prince searches far and wide for the beautiful woman who had stolen his heart.

Trumpets herald the entrance of the Prince and courtiers, who are still searching for the owner of the lost slipper. The stepsisters try to fit the slipper in vain, and then the Prince notices Cinderella sitting shyly by the fire. The second slipper falls from her pocket, and he is overjoyed to find his love. Returning to the

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
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
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
